Meeting Notes

Participants shared what they did really well this year, involving some form of collaboration:

- Altadena Library District: A beautifully renovated Altadena Main Library
- Altadena Library Foundation: First fundraiser (Taste of 'Dena) in a very long time that made money – \$13,500 in one night!
- Altadena Library: Completed 24 Community Conversations and 1 Town Hall that started a new feeling of possibility in Altadena
- Bill Creim: My Collaborate Pasadena Neighborhood Leadership Institute group sponsored and paid for a 2nd grade dance program at Madison Elementary School
- Bill Creim: My wife and I introduced the doctors at Keck Medical School to the PUSD where they provided free medical care at all PUSD football games
- Bill Creim: The music program, if started, at Jackson expanded to go from kindergarten through 5th grade
- Bill Creim: Tutored kids in the Reading Partners program
- Caltech Educational Outreach: 1,000 young students participated in summer programs
- Caltech Educational Outreach: Coding in the classroom at Jefferson Elementary
- Caltech Educational Outreach: Coordinated Visiting Scientist Program at Cleveland Elementary, reaching all students at K-5 school
- ChapCare: Formed new partnership with Lyft
- ChapCare: Mentioned in local and regional media over 100 times
- ChapCare: Renewed as Covered California navigator grantee
- ChapCare: Successfully launched #chapcarechat (twitter chat) that is now gaining national participation
- Collaborate PASadena: Connected and joined PUSD Parent Leaders Group and Community Partners
- College Access Plan: Expanded middle school program at Eliot
- College Access Plan: Increased parent presentations and PTSA
- College Access Plan: Nov 30th students submitted hundreds of CSU and UC applications
- College Access Plan: Provided essential college information to over 800 mainstream and alternative HS students
- College Access Plan: Provided free SAT Test prep to 250 students to increase access to 4-year college
- College Access Plan: Supported 500 PUSD alumni through college graduation
- Coordinated a successful Youth Leadership Conference
- Day One: Collaborated to produce two amazing Art Nights (w/3,000+ in attendance at each one)
- Day One: Got Youth Network meetings off the ground!
- Day One: Held two highly effective press conferences on dangers of marijuana edibles



- Day One: Summer Block 9 served over 2,000 people
- Day One: Worked with City of Pasadena to keep our NO marijuana dispensaries stance in place
- Encouraged a client to support Tree People at level of \$10 million or more for forest project
- Engaged principals in PUSD and encouraged them in their arts programs
- Found housing for a homeless Veteran
- Gave 75 families a new educational option for our community
- Grew neighborhood engagement with Reading Partners through Walk to Read initiative
- Identified others in the community who support public education and public schools, building relationships with them
- Halloweenland Neighborhood Party
- Held another successful Neighborhood Summit
- Held successful 2nd grade summer book drive
- Installed a school garden, having 2 school-wide field trips (no one got lost!) and having our first parent collaboration event
- Lake Avenue Community Foundation: Healthy Families Trauma Informed Care
- Launched Pasadena as an Early Learning City on Sept. 23, 2017, with over 3,000 people in attendance
- Leadership Pasadena: Expanded our brand awareness and reach with organizations and individuals beyond Pasadena to the greater San Gabriel Valley
- Leadership Pasadena: Recruited the largest LP class (20) in several years
- Leadership Pasadena: Secured a \$30k grant from the Annenberg Foundation for LP Vets program launching in 2018
- No Future Café: ArtNight Pasadena Collaboration with Day One
- No Future Café: Held popular Open Studio Nights
- Organized our community garden to be more active (meeting, establishing goals etc.)
- Pacific Oaks College: Established YWCA-GLA partnership
- Pacific Oaks College: Graduated our biggest commencement class of almost 600 students in May
- Pacific Oaks College: Launched BA-Completion and Master's program in Advocacy and Social Justice, honoring our history in inclusion and social justice
- Pacific Oaks College: Purchased our campus property, establishing our "forever home" in District 3 in Pasadena
- Participated in a dual language parent work group where we are problem-solving student recruitment and parent communication among all DLIP PUSD schools
- Pasadena Education Network: Helped hundreds of families learn about the great opportunities PUSD has to offer
- Pasadena Education Network: Reached out to many new Altadena families, informing them about PUSD
- Pasadena Educational Foundation: Doubled the size of our volunteer program
- Pasadena Educational Foundation: Helped to raise millions of dollars for public school children!
- Pasadena Educational Foundation: Provided "best opportunity I've ever taken" to a first-year college student
- Pasadena Educational Foundation: Realtor Initiative experienced growth
- Pasadena Public Library: Had a great Young Reader's League Program, with a book selected by a committee of all kids! The author visited schools and reached hundreds of people while she was visiting from Tennessee.
- Pasadena Public Library: Organized an amazing festival to announce the City is becoming an Early Learning City and to introduce the new Office of the Young Child!
- Pasadena Public Library: Successful event with novelist Amor Towles. Lines down the street for tickets!
- Rally to End Child Poverty Event
- Reading Partners: 97% of our students met their literacy goals
- Reading Partners: Recruited 400+ volunteers in Pasadena
- Reading Partners: Winner "Best of Pasadena" from Pasadena Weekly
- Realtor Read Across Pasadena

- Signed contract with Live Oaks Memorial Park in Monrovia for \$1.25 million acquiring the land for Muslim burials
- SKILLZ 2017: Gave 86 high-risk kids the opportunity to make up some much needed credits, feeling loved and important
- Started Office of the Young Child for City of Pasadena
- Successful Collaborate PASadena cohort this year!
- This year was awesome sauce I was able to complete a 30 year project with the city of Pasadena that included helping our children, which matters the most
- Won most progressive non-profit organization award of San Gabriel Valley from Congresswoman Judy Chu
- Young and Healthy: 21 trauma informed talks since September, reaching over 1,000 people
- Young and Healthy: Embarked on parent education around brain development and living with trauma
- Young and Healthy: Moved to Peoria Place

- Joined an Indivisible Group that meets bi-weekly taking actions to support the things we feel makes this
 country great
- Solved neighborhood parking issues for Mentor

- Graduated from the Neighborhood Leadership Institute
- Marched in Washington (Women's March)
- Successfully completed Neighborhood Leadership Institute and acquired leadership skills
- Visited Mexico City and Dubai; left my job
- Developed a monthly newsletter
- Can now do a roll up/sit up, after trying for a few weeks

- Evaluation of programs to codify our successes with external advisors/evaluators
- Design, build, and launch "Stelier" Café/studio space for Hospitality Innovation and Art
- Dramatically increase college going for young men of color
- Creating a partnership model of our program to reach more children in innovative ways
- Implement Leadership Pasadena Vet Program
- Continue making CAP a staple program within PUSD and imprinted throughout the district
- Bring trauma informed care to all of PUSD and beyond
- Take more active role at mosque and bring local faith-based orgs together putting common faith-based values in action with other faith communities
- Take the CPNLI to other communities via Office of Congresswoman Judy Chu
- Integration with Equity: Prepare document, give tools to parents integrated with schools
- Create Learning Literacy Center: Library and supporting non-profits in one building
- Improve office communication
